# Lahaina Fire Media Reports, Photos, and Videos

\*Note: This report mentioned Hurricane Dora as a cause of the high winds. Further investigations later showed that the hurricane had negligible influence on the fire. The actual issue was strong winds driven by synoptic scale pressure gradients over Hawaii. However, the majority of this report gives an excellent minute-by-minute timeline.

- Ranks among the deadliest fires in U.S. history
- Evening of 7 August 2023, hazardous conditions due to high winds and extreme fire danger. The Maui County Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) partially activated the Emergency Operations Center (EOC).
- High winds arrived on 8 Aug, toppling trees, utility poles fell, and power lines were downed, blocking critical roadways, which made evacuation challenging.
- The origin of the fire can be traced back to 6:35 am on 8 Aug 2023. when a fast-moving brush fire, also later known as "Lahaina AM fire", ignited near Ku'ialua Street and Ho'okahua Place. The cause of fire is unknown.
- Fire suppression faced the intense wind and a challenging location. Fire was thought to be successfully extinguished, and the fire-response personnel returned to their quarters at around 2:17 pm 8 Aug 2023 local time.
- However, at 2:55 pm, a "Lahaina PM fire" was reported at the same location as the earlier fire. It spread rapidly through direct flame contact, radiant heating and flying embers. Evacuation was limited as the fire was funneled into some of the escape routes, further hindered by downed utility poles and electrical lines. People were forced to use ocean for safe refuge.
- Most of the devastation to Lahaina occurred during 8 and 9 Aug 2023.

- As of 3 September, the Lahaina fire is reported to be 100% contained, with an estimated 2,170 acres burned.
- There are 115 confirmed fatalities, with 100% of the Lahaina disaster area searched, according to officials.

# **Contributing Conditions**

- The US drought weather map (From University of Nebraska-Lincoln) showed on May 2023 that the Lahaina area had had sufficient rainfall to be drought-free. But due to the lack of rainfall in mid to late summer, the drought increased to be significant by August.


- High pressure north of Hawaii and Low pressure from the ITCZ belt south of Hawaii, created large pressure gradient, which drove a very strong easterly wind over the area that encompassed the Hawaii Islands.
- Hurricane Dora's influence, which located south of Hawaii, was too small to have much an impact in increasing wind, compared to the extremely strong synoptic-scale pressure gradient and its resultant surface winds.
- The Lahaina fire occurred on the Western side of West Maui mountain. Easterly wind going up and down two consecutive mountains, east of Lahaina, resulted in a very dry (low relative humidity) and fast downslope windstorm in the Lahaina area.





### Article summary:

The article documented the events of August 8, 2023, when wildfires devastated Lahaina, Maui. Early morning winds escalated into a brush fire that was initially contained but rekindled in the afternoon, rapidly spreading and overwhelming the town. Residents, facing smothering smoke and lack of escape routes, fled in chaos, with some seeking refuge in the ocean. The fires, fueled by high winds and dry conditions, resulted in significant destruction, inadequate emergency alerts, and a disorganized evacuation, leaving Lahaina in ruins and survivors grappling with the aftermath.










### Article summary:

Interviews with survivors reveal a lack of timely warnings and chaotic evacuation efforts. Many residents were trapped in traffic, some resorting to flee into the ocean to escape the flames. The town's water system and 911 services failed, and hydrants ran dry, further complicating firefighting efforts. The article raises questions about the adequacy of emergency management and the role of climate change in exacerbating wildfire risks.



took five hours, by which time it was too late. The delay and its impact on firefighting efforts sparked controversy, with some accusing the company of using the tragedy to gain control over the water supply. Environmental groups and state officials debated the prioritization of water usage, particularly between firefighting and traditional agriculture. The incident has prompted calls for changes in water management policies in fire-prone areas.




